

## The Importance of Being Earnest

I feel honored to be allowed to direct The Importance of Being Earnest as my first production with the Worthy Players. It is a classic play by a phenomenally witty playwright who is works have stood the test of time without falter.

As a director one often feels great ownership, and dare I say possessiveness over one's productions right up until the dress rehearsal when there is no more a director can do but hope it goes alright on the night. The ability and motivation of the cast and crew for this production have eased that burden from this poor weary director. I found that props, scenery and even cups of tea simply appearing before my eyes before I had even uttered a request. There has been a real group ownership of this piece throughout the rehearsal process and I feel thankful to both those who appear onstage and those members of the Worthy Players who have worked tirelessly behind the scenes, for allowing me to be, what feels like, a very small part of an enormously welcoming and fantastically organized group.

I would like to thank my Husband for tolerating me speaking lines and ideas in my sleep over the past few weeks and I would like to say a very special thank you to Alison and David Woolford for their hard work, support and faith in my sometimes questionable directorial methods.

I am proud to present on behalf of the Worthy Players; "The Importance of Being Earnest" by Oscar Wilde. The curtain opens on the flat of wealthy Algernon Moncrieff in London's fashionable West End. While Algernon plays the piano, his servant arranges cucumber sandwiches for Lady Bracknell and her daughter Gwendolen. Mr. Jack Worthing and announces his plan to propose marriage to Gwendolen. Algernon demands to know why Jack's cigarette case has an inscription from a mysterious lady.

In the country, Ernest is known as Jack Worthing, he uses a fictional brother called Ernest as an excuse to visit town. Similarly, Algernon has invented an imaginary invalid friend, named Bunbury, whom he visits in the country. Jack enlists Algernon's assistance in distracting Lady Bracknell so that Jack may propose to Gwendolin. Jack then faces severe interrogation from Lady Bracknell, Gwendolen's mother.

#### Act Two

At Jack Worthing's country estate Miss Prism is giving her student, Cecily Cardew, a lesson in German grammar. When Cecily expresses an interest in meeting Jack's wicked brother, Ernest. In her younger days, Miss Prism wrote a three-volume novel, and she proclaims that fiction shows how good people end happily and bad people end unhappily.

The local reverend, Dr Chasuble, enters and takes Miss Prism for a turn in the garden. While they are gone, Algernon arrives pretending to be Jack's brother, Ernest, much to the delight of young Cecily! Jack arrives home in mourning, for his brother Ernest is dead. Cecily announces that Jack's brother Ernest is in the dining room. Algernon announces he is in love with Cecily. She tells Algernon that her dream has always been to marry someone named Ernest.

5 minute Interval

Gwendolen and Cecily are in the morning room of the Manor House waiting for the men to come in from the garden. The ladies still have a problem with Algernon and Jack's Christian names.

All seems well until the arrival of Lady Bracknell. She desires an explanation, and Gwendolen tells her once again that she is engaged to Jack. Algernon adds that he and Cecily are engaged. Immediately, Jack faces another interrogation from Lady Bracknell about Cecily. Lady Bracknell believes her to have "distinct social possibilities." Unfortunately Cecily does not come into her fortune and lose Jack as a guardian until she is 35 years old. So Jack declares that he will agree to the marriage if Lady Bracknell will consent to his engagement to Gwendolen.

Dr. Chasuble arrives and announces that he is ready for the christenings. Miss Prism is waiting for him in the church. The name Prism shocks Lady Bracknell, and she demands to see the governess. Lady Bracknell reveals that Miss Prism left Lord Bracknell's house 28 years ago with a baby carriage. She disappeared, along with the baby. Through Miss Prism's confession Jack's heritage unravels and he finally realises the importance of being earnest.

It doesn't seem long ago that I was writing about 'King Arthur and the Nuts of the Round Table', now we are putting on Oscar Wilde's 'Importance of being Earnest'. 
